

Federal Budget Savings through SourceAmerica and the AbilityOne Program



- People with disabilities constitute the nation's second largest minority group, after Hispanic or Latino Americans.
- The United States Census Bureau estimates that over 40 million Americans have at least one disability as of 2016.
- There are more than 20 million working-age people with disabilities in the United States; 64.1 percent don't have jobs according to the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey.

A BUDGET-POSITIVE SOLUTION


The AbilityOne Program as administered through SourceAmerica saves the federal government from \$176 to \$359 million annually. Annual total savings range from 7 to 14 cents per dollar spent on an AbilityOne contract. The estimated gross savings are primarily driven by fewer federal disability benefits paid on Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) among AbilityOne workers and reduced expenditures on Medicare and Medicaid. Each of these programs spends at least \$35 to \$40 million per year less than they would without the AbilityOne Program. These findings are from a recent study by Mathematica Policy Research that examines the estimated costs and savings to federal benefit programs stemming from the AbilityOne Program.


NUMBER OF ADULT WORKERS WITH DISABILITIES RECEIVING FEDERAL BENEFITS

The graphic below indicates the growing numbers and costs associated with SSI and SSDI programs. These two programs and their related federal health care programs (Medicare and Medicaid) represent a significant percentage of total federal outlays to working-age Americans with disabilities. Doing business with SourceAmerica and the AbilityOne Program creates more jobs for people who have traditionally been dependent on federal benefits.




- SourceAmerica partners with more than 800 nonprofit agencies, providing a wide range of job opportunities to people with significant disabilities.
